

# Critique Sheet for Annotated Bibliography

**REMEMBER:** Use your own paper when you answer the following questions, since the space provided is too little room for good responses. Write as much as you can to help your fellow students. In doing so, you will also help your own grade. (Yes/No or short responses all the way through a critique would earn an “F.” Lengthy, helpful responses always earn a better grade, and they can even help you with your own paper.)

1. Look at the format. Are the entries double-spaced and the annotations single-spaced?

If yes, explain, if not explain what they need and why.

2. Look at the bibliographic information. Does it include the author, the title and all publication information? If yes, explain, if not explain what they need and why.

3. For this set of questions, answer each one separately for each annotation.

A. Do the first few sentences summarize the source briefly?

B. Do the next few sentences assess the source?

C. Do the last few sentences talk about how the source could be used in a paper?

4. When looking at the sources, do you see variety? Are they all from different types?

5. List any final comments or suggestions you have for your the student.
